## Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended 31 December, 2003

### Note 1: Statement of Accounting Policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the applicable Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements. The financial statements have also been prepared on the basis of historical costs and do not take in to account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the company in the preparation of the financial statements.

### (a) Income tax

The company is a tax exempt entity and is therefore not liable for income tax.

### (b) Segment Reporting

The company operates solely in the marine research industry within Australia.

### (c) Auditors Remuneration

The auditor's remuneration relates solely to the audit of the financial statements.

### (d) Related Parties

#### 5. FUNDRAISING

This area of our operations continues to be of concern. As previously reported we no longer employ fundraising consultants as they have not proved to be cost effective, having raised \$200,000 in tied funds and \$50,000 in untied funds at a cost of \$190,000. We have taken over this internally, in line with the Board decision, effective from the 19th September 2003.

In this day and age when numerous calls are made on individuals, companies and corporations it is the initial entrée to that entity that is critical in obtaining support. Once the ground has been broken then it is easier for the Foundation to continue the negotiation and the chances of success are markedly improved. It is essential therefore that directors use their best endeavours to assist the staff in securing these initial meetings.

Directors will recall that those attending the last Board meeting were asked to approach a number of companies with whom they had personal contact. The results of these approaches are listed on pages 4 to 7 of this report.

It will be obvious from this summary that only a small minority of directors have been able to assist to date. If the Foundation is to succeed in the future there will need to be a much greater involvement from all directors.

### 7. PROJECTS

### a. Crown of Thorns Starfish Control Program 2002/3

We were successful in obtaining a further \$300,000 from the Federal Government which carried the program through to the 15th December 2003 rather than finish in August 2003 as scheduled. A final report has been submitted and accepted by both Governments. In addition the State Government contracted the CRC Coastal Zone to evaluate the effectiveness of the program and I am pleased to report that the review was very complimentary in fact nominating the Program as "one of the best of it's type in the world". Electronic versions of this report are available to Directors if required.

### b. Crown of Thorns Starfish Control Program 2004/7

Toward the end of last year approaches were made to Government for the funds to enable the COTS program to continue. AMPTO approached the State Government and, because of our good relationship with the Minister for Environment other Federal Ministers and Queensland based Federal members, we approached the Federal Government on their behalf.

In December both the Federal and State Governments (individually) announced additional funding for the control of COTS. The total commitment amounts to \$3 million over the next three years with 50% coming from each Government. The new program commences on 1st January 2004 and the first payment will be made on signing of the contracts. This will be by the end of January in the case of the Federal Government and March in the case of the State Government as they will be in caretaker mode until after the elections and unable to sign contracts.

Government funds will be paid to AMPTO who will again contract the Foundation to undertake the work on their behalf and hire our vessel for the duration of the contract. This will provide us with an assured income of \$250,000 per annum for the next three years.

We have, in the meanwhile entered into contracts with AMPTO to run the project on their behalf, and with the current COTS Control Officer – Colin McKenzie - to conduct the program on our behalf. The first payment of \$200,000 was made by the Federal Government during the 4<sup>th</sup> week in January as an advance against the contract to allow the project to continue pending the signing of contracts and bridging finance was provided by AMPTO to cover wages prior to that. This bridging finance will be repaid from funds received for the project.

We have also introduced a new set of accounts which will allow us to accurately report to the Audit Committee and Board the day to day activity of the COTS Program.



### C. SPONGE AQUACULTURE

This project continues to progress slowly owing to the issues surrounding native title claims over the research site. The CRC Torres Strait will however commence field testing in the Straits early this year and it is hoped that the program will get back on track. This is a long term project and will continue to need support for a number of years

We are actively seeking additional funding for this project which has significant applications for developing countries in the Indo-Pacific region.

#### d. CRC TORRES STRAIT

The Foundation is an Associate Member of CRC Torres Strait by virtue of its involvement with the Sponge Aquaculture project. This will increase our exposure particularly in the Torres Strait region. The CRC Torres Strait is an off-shoot of CRC Reef Research Centre.

#### e. BALLAST WATER

This project is one of the most exciting undertaken by the Foundation. The program has been somewhat delayed by the need to redesign the High Volume Sonic Disintegrator (HVSD). Modular Solution Technologies (MST) has now despatched the redesigned unit and tests will get underway shortly. In the meanwhile further tests using the older unit continue.

There has been some lack of communication between MST and the researchers but the issue has now been resolved by teleconference between MST, Prof Reichelt and me. Things should now proceed smoothly.

We have also received written confirmation of payment of a royalty of 8% on all HSVD units sold as a result of the project<sup>3</sup>

#### f. IRUKANDJI

The second series of payments for the three successful researchers have been made and we have received progress reports on results to date. We have also paid the sum of \$15,000 to Lisa-Ann Gershwin as a contribution to her PhD costs from funds received from the Robert J King Memorial Trust in the USA, as required by the Trust.

### g. SUNRISE AT 1770/BINGIL BAY

After the Board decision not to proceed with projects requiring us to act as project-managers we have advised both Michael Baevski and QPWS that we will not be proceeding with either the Sunrise or Bingil Bay projects. Michael has contracted MST to install the water purification and sewage plants and donated the land to the Australian Bush Heritage Foundation.

The Water purification plant has been constructed and will be transported to site early February. QPWS will endeavour to find a new tenant for the property at Bingil Bay.

### h. Coral Regeneration

This program is set to commence in July 2004 after receipt of funding to be provided by Comalco. It will be run as a collaborative venture between AIMS and the University of Queensland and Comalco. The program has the full support of the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority (GBRMPA) and will also benefit from assistance from Comalco employees in the Gladstone area.

#### h. International Conference

In July we hosted a workshop attended by leading coral reef researchers on Coral Health. The paper which resulted will be used as a basis for an international seminar which will be held in 2005, attracting researchers, managers and philanthropists worldwide to attempt to prioritise the threats facing coral reefs around the world and to initiate research to address the issues.

In the interim ISAC have agreed to produce a strategic paper on the issues which will be available to the Board and may be presented at the seminar

### 8. CAUSE RELATED MARKETING

#### a. FADA (PACIFIC COAST ECO BANANAS) LIMITED

Income from this company continues to grow and they have now secured substantial orders from the UK and QANTAS. The owners were recently awarded the Australian Institute of Management 'Queensland Rural/Remote Manager of the Year' for their environmentally friendly production protocols.

### b. Queensland Tissue Products

Revenue from this company has grown well and we have experienced a 100% increase in revenue since the association began 12 months ago. We have actively assisted in the introduction of the company to prospective customers and this has been greatly appreciated. I anticipate additional increases in each quarterly payment for at least the next 4/5 years.

#### c. Fuchs Oils.

Initial testing of soluble oils have been conducted with samples (1000 litre) provided by Ford in Melbourne. Initial results have been outstanding and results of further laboratory tests are due shortly (1st Feb). If these are as positive as expected, a full scale research proposal will be funded by Fuchs (\$500,000) through the Foundation at the Ford factory in Melbourne and overseen by the CRC Reef. This will commence in April.



MST has agreed to give Fuchs an exclusive licence to sell the process (disinfecting soluble oils) to end-users worldwide. The Foundation will receive its 8% royalty on all sales of the HVSD unit.

### d. MODULAR SOLUTION TECHNOLOGIES (MST)

Our association with MST continues to grow and prospects for long-term, untied funding of the Foundation look very promising.

- i. Foundation Director Michael Baevski has funded:
  - 1. a water purification and,
- 2. a sewage plant, using the MST technology, at his environmental residential development at Sunrise near the Town of 1770, on the coast between Gladstone and Bundaberg, at the southern end of the Great Barrier Reef. Once completed this plant will be an ideal demonstration unit for the sale of this unique technology and is a world first in the treatment of sewage.
- ii. The Ballast Water project is back on track
- iii. The Soluble oil project has completed its pilot testing and full scale testing will commence shortly.
- iv. An aqua-culture application is currently being discussed with the Dept. of Primary Industries.

As previously mentioned, the company (MST) have formally agreed to pay to the Foundation a cause related marketing fee of 8% on the sales of the HSVD when it is used in applications to treat the following products.

- i. Sewage
- ii. Drinking water
- iii. Soluble oils
- iv. Hospital waste
- v. Aqua-culture effluent

Whilst it is impossible to assess exactly what revenue will be derived from MST without a track record, Directors should be aware of the fact that in excess of \$US 5 Trillion is presently spent on water treatment annually4.

#### 9. ANNUAL BUDGET

I attach a draft budget (Attachment A) for consideration by the Board. This budget does not contain any allowance for a CEO and this issue is detailed in section 11 (Future Direction). You will see from the budget that overall expenditure is down by some 50% as a result of this and other savings. As agreed with AMPTO, our Executive Assistants wages are drawn from the COTS program and are therefore also not reflected in the Budget.

I have allowed a contingency of 12% and there are other areas where savings could be made if necessary e.g. Newsletter - by sending out 2 per year instead of 4.

### 10. CASH DEMAND

Based on the Draft Budget for 2004 and the assured incomes for the period, together with an estimate of potential earnings which have a high degree of probability, I have drawn up an estimated cash flow position which I believe accurately reflects the financial situation of the Foundation (attachment B).

You will see from this that we have a realistic expectation of paying all outstanding research grants and ending the year in the black. I have not taken into account any potential earning as a result of greater involvement in fundraising by Directors. Neither have I taken into account any bequests or undocumented commitments.

#### 11. FUTURE DIRECTION

As you know, I have submitted my resignation and will hand over my duties as Managing Director. As a Founding Member I intend seeing out my current term as a Director and will continue to provide whatever assistance I can in furthering the Aims of the Foundation.

#### a. CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

As you will have seen from the draft Budget I have not included remuneration for a Chief Executive. My reasons for this are as follows

- i. With the cash position as it stands, the Foundation is able to meet all its current commitments as can be seen from the "Cash Demand". If the costs of a CEO were included this situation would change and the Foundation would run into debt.
- ii. It is entirely possible (but not certain) that additional funding to cover the cost of employing a CEO can be raised during the course of the next financial year.
- iii. I believe that with input and assistance from Directors, including myself, at no cost to the Foundation, our staff can supply the necessary support for the fundraising effort in the short-term as well as carrying out their normal administrative functions.
- iv. All payments including monthly creditors can be prepared by the bookkeeper and vetted by the audit committee prior to payment.
- v. Once sufficient funding has been generated, then and only then, should we consider appointing a CEO.

My recommendation to the Board therefore is that it considers delaying appointing a CEO until such time as sufficient funds are available.



### **b. FINANCIAL ACHIEVEMENTS**

I would like to take the opportunity of listing some of the achievements of the Foundation over the past four and a half years which may not be immediately apparent to some of our newer directors.
